DIARY OF A LUNE VALLEY VICAR by Mark Cannon

Distractions ...

Sunday: I have taken the new Bishop's advice seriously. 'You don't have to stick to the rules', he ill-advisedly wrote to all his clergy, 'Just go and get new people in!' So, tripping up the hills to do Evensong out in the wild borderlands of Lowgill, I decided to do without my uniform of cassock, surplice etc. It was a strange feeling: for a start, it was cold dressed as a normal human being and ten minutes in I was assailed by the conviction that my flies were down. Well, you can cover a lot of things in a full length black woollen dress that are not possible in a pair of M&S chinos and I had to pretend to kneel in prayer to check that all was safely gathered in.

Sunday: Is it just me, then, who gets easily distracted by any number of thoughts when I should be doing something else? If one of my very close relations starts wittering on about family matters, then I tend to drift off and forget the names of grandchildren etc. If I am at worship, rather than thinking pure and holy thoughts, then I can often try to work out the mystic significance of the hymn numbers, and how many primes are hidden therein. But I was more than gladdened today when during the sermon, a congregant slipped out of church and returned a few minutes later. After the service he explained that he had too strong a cappuccino before coming to church and then had to respond to an urgent need ... 'and' he said 'I couldn't think of a better time to go than during your sermon.' Ta very much!

But I expect this is not rare and worship is both easy (walking on the tops on a crisp winter's day) and also very difficult. For example, trying to pray when there's no answer, trying to be holy when you feel like a worm, or simply getting bored during Matins. When we get distracted, and there are oh so many temptations, we drift away from God, and drift away from the source of so much joy and goodness. Jesus must have gone through the same and we read that he went off by himself to a quiet place to pray for hours. If He had to be disciplined and even He had to make a special effort, why do we think that it is going to be easy for us?

VISITING CHURCHES THE CHURCH BEFORE THE CHURCH

On one of those road maps which are always reduced to £2.99, you will find by Killin, at the head of Loch Tay, indication of a 'Folklore Centre'. It does not exist and has not existed for four years. Never mind! The old mill where it was sited still holds some interesting remnants of a Saint.

Before our village churches were built, the church (that is the Christian people) often met by a stone cross (we call them 'Celtic Crosses'). But, before even that, they met at the sound of a copper bell carried and rung by a missionary saint, and the 'church' was wherever he planted his wooden cross or decorated crozier (Scottish 'quigrich').

The Old Mill at Killin has interesting exhibits relating to St Fillan, who was one of those ancient Irish saints who brought Christianity to Scotland. He founded his first simple monastery at Auchentyre by Tyndrum. Almost nothing remains of it because the stones were used to build the farm. Later he moved into the Trossachs, converting and baptising people who lived in the glens. At Killin he would ring his great bell to summon the people to a rock under a pine tree. There he would plant his quigrich and preach.

Rock and pine tree have long ago slipped into the river, but the Old Mill still houses three things relating to those early days: the great bell and quigrich of Saint Fillan (but these are replicas of the originals which are held in the Scottish National Museum in Edinburgh) and also eight of his healing stones. These, which are originals, he would hold over the appropriate part of the body of the patient for whom he was praying. It may seem unlikely that such relics still exist, but there was an ancient tradition whereby such things were entrusted to specific families or 'Dewars'. (We were amazed some years ago to find, in the church at the top of Glen Lyon, the original bell of Saint Adomnan, the early Abbot of Iona and biographer of Saint Columba).

So it is that the markers of the church before the church at Killin still exist for us to see in a showcase in the Old Mill as fortunate survivors of a Folklore Centre that ceased to exist four years ago.
